Deshon II Nears Groundbreaking

As the first transitional program ever to be located on federal property, Deshon Place is a true success story. The project has been helping the homeless since 2001, and now Deshon II will be expanding the assistance available to the homeless population by adding ten additional units.

Deshon Place is a supportive housing program for homeless single adults, aged 18-62, providing shelter and supportive services essential for homeless adults to attain self-sufficiency and successful community reintegration. While it is located on the Butler Veterans Administration property, the services provided are not exclusively for veterans.

As the first program in Butler County to be funded through the HUD McKinney-Vento Grant, Deshon Place has continued to surpass benchmarks for serving the homeless. More than 75% of those entering Deshon Place over the last five years have moved on to stable, permanent housing and nearly 56% were discharged with employment.

Deshon continues to adapt to a



changing environment, offering additional and improved services. One important strategy has been partnering with Butler County Community College to provide free financial literacy classes in addition to GED classes and other continuing education opportunities. Helping clients establish a strong financial understanding goes a long way in their success upon leaving the facility.

Groundbreaking for the ten additional units known as Deshon II will begin in April. This expansion will be an important step in meeting the increasing needs of Butler County's continuum of care. ■

Under Our Wing Receives Prestigious Bellamy Award

Under Our Wing, the innovative apartment complex developed by the Housing Authority and the YWCA, was presented with the Pennsylvania Association of Housing and Redevelopment Authority's Bellamy Award in December, 2006. The annual award is the highest recognition a project can receive from the Association.

Opening in October, 2005, Under Our Wing had 100 percent occupancy and has been full ever since. The goal of the project is to provide affordable housing and free assisted-living services to those

residents who need them. The YWCA provides the assisted living services--a home health aide, a hot lunch, laundry, and housekeeping services--while the Housing Authority served as the developer of the project, making it a win-win partnership for everyone involved.

While this is the first development of its kind, those involved hope it won't be the last. "We'd like to see this project become a model for success in other areas, and are working to make that happen," said Housing Authority Executive Director Perry O'Malley. ■
